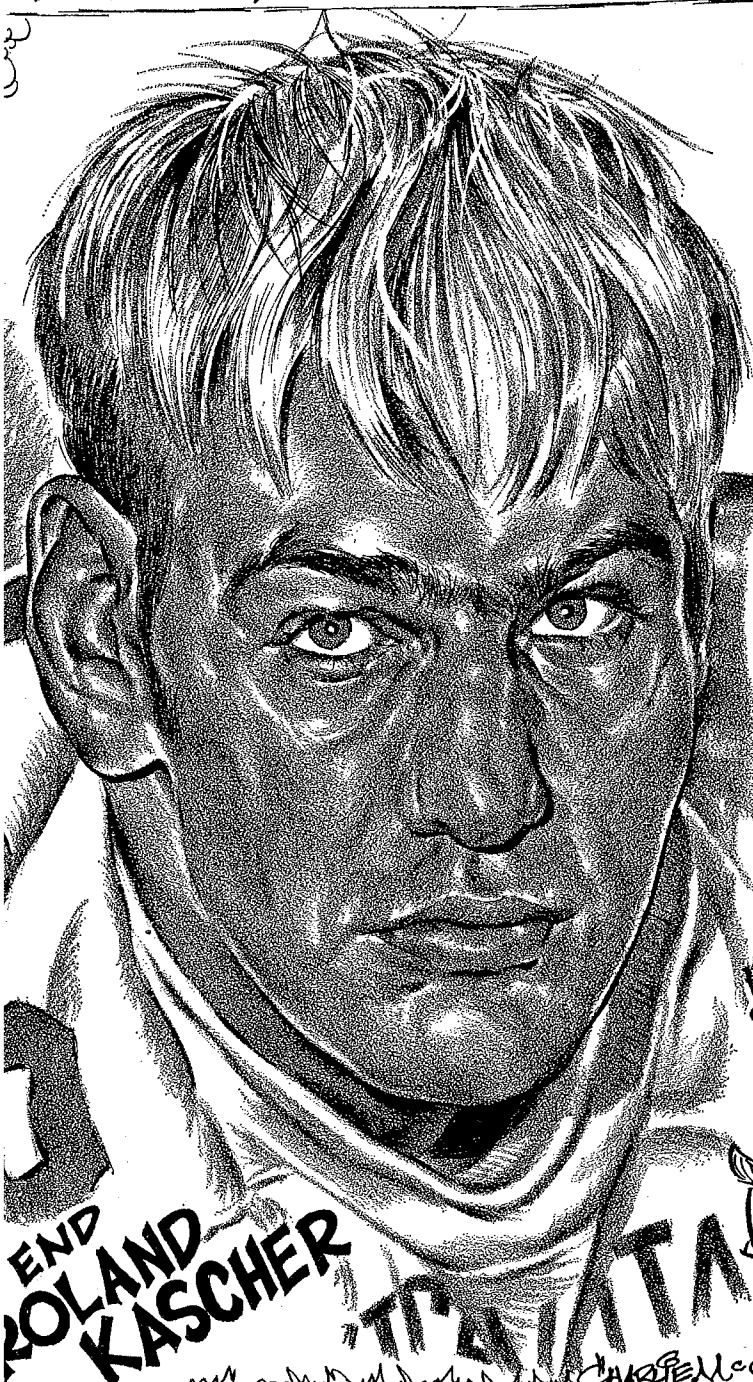


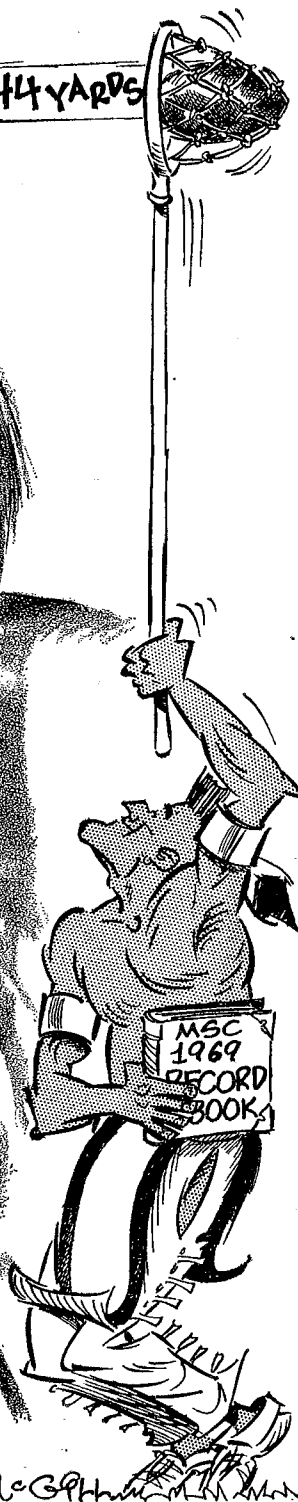
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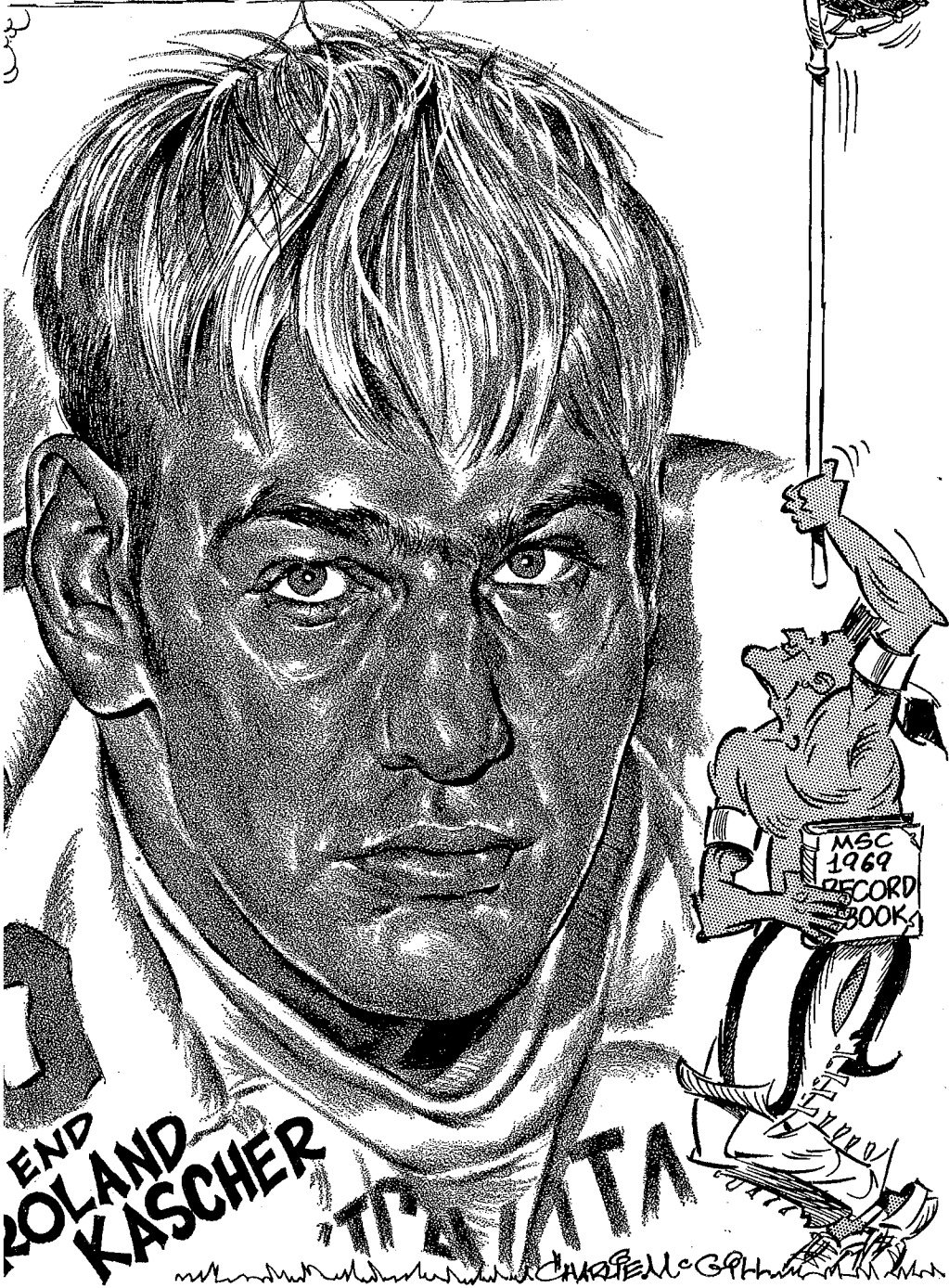

**DIRECTIONS TO
MONTCLAIR STATE COLLEGE**

Montclair State College is located on Valley and Normal Avenues, Upper Montclair. The College is one mile south of the junction of Routes 3 and 46 on Valley Road.

From *Route 46 East* the landmark is West's Diner; take the next right, Valley Road — one mile to blinker at Normal Avenue.

From *Route 46 West*, the landmark is the junction with Route 3. Turn on Valley Road to Montclair, bear right on cloverleaf and proceed south under Route 46—one mile to blinker at Normal Avenue.

From the *Turnpike North* of Exit 10 or *South* from George Washington Bridge, turn at Route 3 West of Route 46 West, then as above. From the *Turnpike South* of Exit 10, leave the Turnpike at Exit 10 and follow directions for Garden State Parkway North.

From *Garden State Parkway South*, turn left at Exit 153B and proceed West on Route 3 to Valley Road.

From *Garden State Parkway North*, turn at Route 46 West (Clifton Exit 154) then to Valley Road. If you miss that turn, continue South to Exit 151, Watchung Avenue, then West to Valley Road and North to blinker at Normal Avenue.

MONTCLAIR STATE COLLEGE

Montclair State College is young enough to enjoy occasional visits from members of its first graduating class, and old enough to have acquired a set of cherished traditions and secured a place among the country's distinguished institutions of higher education.

Founded in 1908 as a two-year normal school, it became a four-year State Teachers College in 1927. The first four-year graduating class was in 1932.

Four hundred feet above sea level, the campus in Upper Montclair, New Jersey, looks over broad valleys to the skyline of New York City. The original 25 acres have grown, through subsequent purchases, to 90.

The school's first building, a multipurpose structure of Spanish Mission design, is still a campus landmark. It is now one of 26 buildings, including a modern gymnasium with indoor swimming pool, a 1000-seat auditorium, library with space for 150,000 volumes, a convertible little theater, suitable for both proscenium and arena productions.

Dr. Charles S. Chapin, who abandoned a legal career to devote himself to education, was the normal school's first principal.

Montclair State has been served by many men of distinction who have left their mark as educators and authors. One of the most colorful of these was the school's first mathematics teacher, John C. Stone. Born in a log cabin, Professor Stone had only four months of formal education when he entered the college. His mathematics textbooks were used in every state in the union, and their sales reached over 20 million.

The immediate past president of the College, Dr. E. DeAlton Partridge, is now president of Near East Foundation. The current president, Dr. Thomas H. Richardson, is internationally known for his work in the field of education.

In 1958 the College dropped the word "teachers" from its title, foretelling its wider role in New Jersey education. While the school continues to prepare teachers for the public schools of the state, primarily in secondary education, it now offers an extensive liberal arts program.

When Montclair Normal School opened its doors for the first time, it welcome a student body of 187, almost all of them women. Today there are approximately 4,300 undergraduates, close to two-thirds of whom are women.

Montclair State is primarily a commuter college. A large percentage of its enrollment is drawn from the counties of Northern New Jersey.

The intercollegiate athletic program of MSC now includes 11 sports. Teams on the varsity level are fielded in football, soccer, and cross-country in the fall; basketball, fencing, gymnastics and wrestling in the Winter; and baseball, track, golf and tennis in the spring.

The athletic program is under the direction of the Montclair Athletic Commission, a body composed of faculty and students. The program is administered by the Director of Athletics, William P. Dioguardi.

At present, the Montclair State faculty includes a number of prominent educators, among them Dr. Russell Krauss, a Chaucerian scholar of world renown; Paul Clifford, a leading quality control expert; Dr. Sampson McDowell, authority on oceanography; Dr. Bertha B. Quintana, well-known anthropologist; and Dr. Harold M. Scholl, a pioneer in speech therapy.

**THE MONTCLAIR ATHLETIC COMMISSION
OF MONTCLAIR STATE COLLEGE**

All intercollegiate sports at Montclair State College are under direct control of the Montclair Athletic Commission. The Commission composed of four student representatives chosen by the Student Government Association and four faculty representatives (nonmembers Physical Education Department) appointed by the Administration the College.

The Director of Athletics acts as chairman of the MAC with vote, except in the case of a tie.

The purpose of the Commission is to foster varsity, junior freshman, intramural and athletic club activities.

WILLIAM DIOGUARDI
Director of Athletics

For more than half his life, Bill Dioguardi has been involved in every facet of athletics. More than 20 years he has been an outstanding scholastic and collegiate athlete, high school and college coach, and is now a top-flight administrator on the intercollegiate level.

In 21 seasons at the helm of the Indians baseball team, Dioguardi led his nines to 300 wins while losing only 139 games. During 20 of those seasons, MSC posted records of .500 or better. He retired as baseball coach in June, 1969.

In the matter of championships, Dioguardi's teams won the New Jersey State College Conference crowns in 1963, 64, 66 and 69, and in the former New Jersey Intercollegiate Athletic Conference his teams finished on top in 1949, 51, 53, 54 and 66.



A graduate of the University of Notre Dame, Bill's first coaching assignment was handling the "Fighting Irish" frosh nine while studying for his master's degree.

Cited many times for his outstanding coaching, Dioguardi has four times been named Coach of the Year by the NJSCC in baseball. In addition to baseball, Bill has served as an assistant in both football and basketball at MSC at various times.

Dioguardi served as director of athletics and football and basketball coach at College High School, demonstration high school operated by Montclair State from 1955 to 1968.

A graduate of Kearny High School, class of 1941, Dioguardi was a standout in baseball and basketball.

One of New Jersey's top scholastic and college officials, Dioguardi has worked 2,000 athletic contests in football and basketball. He is presently supervisor of officials for the Atlantic Coast Football League.

Dioguardi, appointed Director of Athletics in March, 1968, is married to the former Theresa Lovley and is the father of four children.

CLARY ANDERSON, HEAD COACH

It would be difficult, perhaps impossible, to find a man who has enjoyed the overwhelming success of Clary Anderson in sports. As a player on the scholastic, college and professional level he never played on a losing team. As a coach for more than 25 years he had unparalleled success in football, baseball, basketball, ice hockey and swimming.

Last year, Anderson's first at Montclair State, he led the football team to a great comeback mark of eight wins and two losses. Montclair won the New Jersey State College Conference championship. In the Eastern Football Conference, the Indians changed from doormat to contender by finishing a strong second. In the NCAA College Division, Montclair State ranked seventh in total defense and eighth in rushing defense. Montclair ranked fifth in the East in the Lambert Bowl ratings.

Clary was an All-State fullback at Montclair High School in 1929. Upon graduation in 1930, he attended Cook Academy before entering Colgate University. Playing football under the late Andy Kerr, Anderson was a standout for three seasons receiving All-East and All-American recognition. The Red Raiders posted marks of 9-0, 8-1 and 7-1. The loss in 1933 was to Tylane, 7-0 at Yankee Stadium, and in 1934 the loss was at Ohio State 10-7. Anderson played both quarterback and fullback and was co-captain with his roommate, Jack Fritas, also of Montclair.

In the 27 scholastic years Anderson coached football at Blair Academy and at Montclair High School, he enjoyed 12 undefeated seasons, 14 state championships and 19 sectional titles. The scholastic record was 209-23-1.

Anderson can be particularly proud of many of his products. Edwin "Buz" Aldrin, famed astronaut who walked on the moon, was the center on Clary's undefeated 1946 team. Aubrey Lewis, once a world record holder, is vice-president of F. W. Woolworth Co. John Emery, winner of the Poe award at Princeton, is Vice President of McGraw-Hill. Royce Flippin (Princeton), Joe Fortunato (Yale) Dave McKelvey (Cornell) and Sandy Sand (Delaware) were football captains. Mike Nichols and Warren Rauhofer are airline captains today. Hollie Donnan was an All-American tackle at Princeton. Jay Johnson, Garvie Craw, Larry Hubbard, Bill Byrne, Ron Burton, and Lewis played pro football. Bert Stiff, Dick Emery, Tom Wilson, John Tyson, Ben Mobley and Rusty Garthwaite played for outstanding college teams. In basketball, Butch van Breda-Kolff is coaching the Detroit Pistons. Wally Choice (Indiana), Nick Pond (North Carolina State), Whitey Fulcomer (Princeton) and Harry Zingg and Gerry Samuels (Vermont) captained their college basketball teams. "Gus" Keriazkos, Royce Flippin, Aubrey Lewis, Richie Haines and Len Coleman were all selected by the Newark A.C. and Newark Boy's Club as the outstanding athlete in the state.

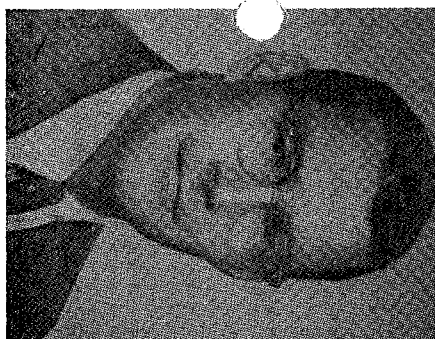
Anderson also coached many outstanding players in semipro and summer college league and service baseball. These include John Podres, John Kucks, Turk Farrell, Dick Sisler, John Berardino and Bob Scheffing—the Mets' general manager.

Recent Montclair State graduate Dan Rodgers is placekicking for the Jersey Jays. Hard hitting Frank Rossi has signed with the baseball Yankees and will report when his military obligations permit.

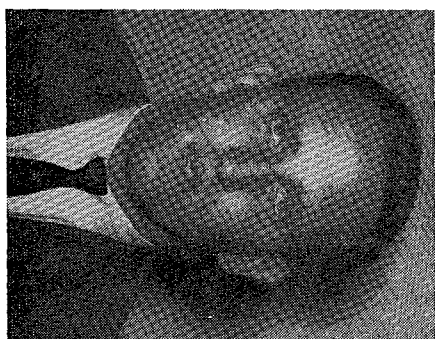
During World War II, Anderson served four years in the U.S. Naval Air Corps and reached the rank of lieutenant-commander.

Anderson is married to the former Claire Louise Aubrey. The Andersons are parents of a daughter Susan, a senior, and the head girl cheer-

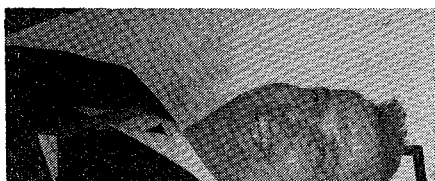

DONALD MACKAY
Defensive Coach

Now in his second season with the MSC staff, Mackay works the defensive team during the week, scouts opponents and also fills the role of chief administrative assistant to Coach Clary Anderson.

The Massachusetts native was an assistant coach at Ridgewood High School for two years prior to his switch to Montclair State. That, he had earned his varsity letter as a tackle for three years at University of Massachusetts after serving in the Marine Corps for years.

Mackay, who has a B.S. and master's degree from Massachusetts in Waldwick (N.J.) with his wife Priscilla and his two sons, can, 8, and David, 5.

TIMOTHY (TIM) SULLIVAN
Offensive Line Coach

One time MSC opponent as a player and then coach, Sullivan will be instructing the offensive linemen for the fourth season. The Brooklyn native previously had assisted in football and wrestling at Ithaca College while earning his master's degree. He had played against MSC as an undergraduate at Cortland (N.Y.) State where he won letters in wrestling and lacrosse as well as football.

Graduation from Cortland was followed by a year at Tappan Zee (N.Y.) High School as head wrestling and assistant football coach. Then it was off to Ithaca for his master's degree and subsequently, in 1967, he joined the Montclair State College staff.

Sullivan also coaches the wrestling squad and in three years has posted a record of 29 victories and only 10 defeats.

Married and the father of Virginia, 6, and Timothy, Jr., 3, Sullivan is a resident of Little Falls (N.J.).

TOM TESTA
Defensive Coach

Much of the credit for a defense which held opponents without a touchdown through the last five games last season must go to Testa, who was in his first campaign with the varsity after successfully piloting the 1968 freshman club.

Under Testa's "hit-or-sit" policy, the defense responded with four shut-outs, three of them during the late season surge when MSC won six straight. From a points-yield of 179 in 1968, the figure dropped to 88 last fall, an impressive turnaround.

Testa's success with the varsity defense followed a 4-1 record with MSC's first freshman team in history and a five-year mark of 31-12-2 as head coach at Belleville (N.J.) High School. His 1962 Bellboys edition was 8-1, the best record by a Belleville team in 33 years, and he was named Essex County's Coach of the Year for his achievement.

The varsity assignment with MSC reunites Testa with Clary Anderson under whom he played on two Montclair High School state championship teams in 1950-51. Married to the former Christine Carruso, Testa is the father of a girl, Carolyn, 15, and two boys, Thomas, 13, and Edward, 10.

FRANK TRIPUCKA
Offensive Coordinator

A veteran of 15 years as a quarterback in professional football, Tripucka saw service with teams in the Canadian, National and American Leagues.

Tripucka's colorful career in the pro ranks included stints in the U.S. with the Philadelphia Eagles, Detroit Lions, Chicago Cardinals and Dallas Texans in the NFL, plus the Denver Broncos in the AFL.

In his 15-year pro career, Tripucka threw 3,141 passes and completed 1,714 for a sensational percentage of .546. His passes gained 22,732 yards.

One of New Jersey's all-time scholastic greats at Bloomfield High School, Tripucka was one of the nation's top collegiate players in 1948 at Notre Dame.

Married and the father of seven children, Tripucka is president of Trip Distributors, Inc. in Paterson, N.J. The Tripucka family lives in Bloomfield, N.J.

DICK HAPWARD
Head Freshman Coach

In Hapward's first season as head freshman football coach last the young Indians posted a fine 4-2 mark losing to Cornell and Rutgers. The likable frosh mentor is serving his second stint under Head Clary Anderson. He served for five seasons on Anderson's Montclair staff as assistant line coach and head junior varsity coach. His junior varsity team posted a record of 28 wins, 8 losses and 1 tie.

Prior to coaching at Montclair High, Hapward was on the coaching staff at Madison (N.J.) High School.

An outstanding guard at Bloomfield High School in the 1950s, ward played under the late Bill Foley and Warren Lowans. His college football was played at North Carolina State from which he was graduated in 1957.

The MSC frosh coach is manager of Hapward Tennis Shop in Bloomfield, N.J.. He is married to the former Carol Buydos and is the father of two sons.

JOHN BIVIANO
Assistant Freshman Football Coach

A veteran coach of 13 years experience on the high school Biviano joined the Montclair State staff last season.

A standout at Ferris High School (Jersey City) under Coach Gerrity, Biviano played his collegiate football at the University of Denver.

A two year hitch in the Army, Biviano coached one season at Denver High School in Denver, Colorado and following his discharge came to N.J. to join the Nutley High School coaching staff.

As head coach at Nutley, Biviano developed a number of outstanding scholastic players who have gone on to national attention in college. Two of his most recent are Ted Olivio at Arizona State and Ray Taylor at Army.

THE 1970 OUTLOOK...

... By CLARY ANDERSON, Head Coach

A year ago our defense did not give up a touchdown in the last five games and ranked well nationally in both rushing and total defense. All but one of the starters in this unit are returning.

Up front the holdovers are Tom Rothacker, Tom D'Onofrio, Rick Dinmore and Mike Van Zile. Behind them we have stellar linebackers Bob Jensen and Pete Contaldi, corner men John Brunnelly and Joe Kostacki and safeties Al Middleton and Alex Kaplanovich.

Powerful Dennis Reardon, who missed most of last season, and speedsters Jules Gelfic, Tom Goode and Lonnie Moncelsi are other defensive operators who should get their share of playing time.

The offense was steady if not explosive last fall. Bill Knilkowski, a dynamic competitor, made the offense go and set a Montclair State total offense record in his final season with the Indians.

It will be up to Bob Brewster, Ron Gara and sophomore Bob Cosentino to come through at quarterback if the offense is to balance, the defense. While the quarterback position is a question mark, there is no doubt about the running abilities of halfback Glen Morschauer and fullback Tony Valpone who each gained more than 600 yards last year. They are more than outstanding ball carriers. They can do it all well.

Don Cooper and Tim Poor, a pair of explosive outside runners, are backfield veterans who are capable of preventing opposing defenses from gaining up against the tackle-to-tackle strength of Morschauer and Valpone. The offensive line has a superb tight end in Roland Kaseher who's a really fine blocker and an excellent receiver. Doug Salvatorello blossomed at split end late last year. The middle should be strong with veterans Al Avignone and John Bellavia, both tops in college circles, at the guards and Rick Jones, a potent blocker, at center. Jim Magnatta and Jerry Caputo are very capable reserve guards.

If there is a problem spot in the line, it is at tackle where there are no holdovers. However, Larry Adams, a good all-round player who's been hampered by injuries, could fill the bill at one of the tackles.

The kicking game is in capable hands. Brewster was a consistent placekicker who provided important points with three clutch extra points against Glassboro State and three field goals, against Central Connecticut, Trenton State and Jersey City State. Ken Tecza again will handle the punting with Van Zile backing him up.

Returning intact is the coaching staff which is comprised of Tom Testa, a fine defensive coach, Don MacKay, who also works with the defense and is an excellent chief scout. Tim Sullivan, who molded a solid offensive line last fall, Frank Tripucka, the former pro whose offensive know-how is invaluable; and Dick Hapward and John Biviano, who directed the successful freshman team.

The schedule again will be tough. It opens East Stroudsburg, which is smarming from last year's upset. Then a big, mobile Delaware State club, will be particularly rugged, especially since we will again be yielding a physical advantage.

If the Indians retain the fire and drive which increased with each game in 1969, develop a sound passing game, downfield blocking and a tight pass defense, this will be another interesting—and successful—season.

EASTERN FOOTBALL CONFERENCE

Southern Connecticut State failed to win or share the Eastern Football Conference championship last fall—the first time since the circuit formed in 1965—but the title remained in Connecticut when the University of Bridgeport captured the prize.

The Purple Knights' first defense of its newly gained championship will be challenged by the Owls, of course, and the third Connecticut in the league, Central Connecticut, along with New Jersey's two major teams, Montclair State and Glassboro State. Producing their best showings in 1969, the Indians and Profs finished second and third, respectively and may be ready to break the Connecticut domination this season. Bill Diognardi, Montclair State athletic director, has assumed presidency of the conference. He succeeds Jess Dowd, Southern Connecticut State A.D.

1970 OUTLOOK: Glassboro State learned how to win football games last fall, finishing 5-3 for its best record since reinstating the sport in 1964 and missing a pair of conference championships by losing to Bridgeport and Montclair the last two games of the season.

Head coach Dick Wackar anticipates another successful season, despite the heaviest losses he has endured in his six-year regime: 12 key players. Glassboro's greatest losses are in the linebacking department, with Tony Del Duca and Vincent Kuczyński among the missing. The remainder of the defense should be sound, with Mario Harris again anchoring the line and Gary Reiter and Gene Griego expected to bolster a defensive backfield which has gained national ranking three seasons in a row. Wackar hopes for some defensive help from recruits from the school's first freshman team. Offensively, the Profs expect to show more firepower than they've ever managed. "We scored some points last year and it helped develop the confidence we needed," Wackar says.

Sophomore quarterback Billy Hyatt returns, backed up by Larry Winks and by transfer Bob Preziosi, former all-South Jersey QB. Speedster Derek Gytton, slasher Larry Gainer and 235-pound fullback Joe Bell also return. Tex Ritter, Joe Martella and Frank Magill are able receivers. "We should have excellent balance between the running and passing game," Wackar says. "The offense should further relieve the defense of having to hold the opposition scoreless. Glassboro should be able to score this season. The defense needs rebuilding in part, but I expect a good season."

GEORGE HORN

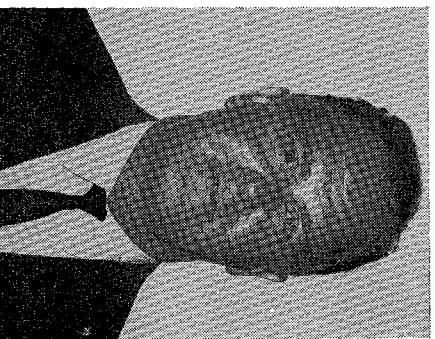
Head Cross-Country Coach

The former standout athlete at Boys High School (Brooklyn, N.Y.) and Albright College is entering his fifth season as head cross country coach. In addition, he is indoor head track coach.

At Boys High, he won varsity in football, basketball and track playing captain of the hoop squad in his year. He participated in the same sports at Albright.

CROSS-COUNTRY

The outlook for 1970 in cross-country is most optimistic. With a goodly number of veterans returning the prospects for improvement over last year's 7-6 dual meet record are excellent.

Horn's strength will be centered around vets Kevin McGrath and Vic Mizzone. Mizzone captured first place in six dual meets last year, placing second in the Collegiate Track Conference and fourth in the Jersey State College Conference championship meets. McGrath is very well, trailing Mizzone in most meets and taking third in the NJ championship meet.

Both Mizzone and McGrath were named to the New Jersey College Conference all-star team.

Supporting the veteran duo will be Steve Shappert, Eugene Weiss and Kevin Hayes while important points should be scored by O'Connor, Bob Nowicki, Frank Winkelman and Phil O'Donnell up last year's freshman team.
