UPPER MONTCLAIR---Montclair State College has accepted an invitation to play in the second annual Knute Rockne Bowl scheduled to be played indoors at Convention Hall, Atlantic City on Saturday afternoon, November 28th.

The accepted bid will mark the first time in MSC intercollegiate football history that the Indians have participated in a postseason football contest. The Indians fielded an intercollegiate football team for the first time in 1928.

The announcement of the bid was greeted with wild cheering on the MSC campus and ended three days of waiting for the Indians rooters. Coach Clary Anderson's Indians finished the season last Saturday by crushing Glassboro State, 45-0.

The bowl bid marks another major step in the Indians march up the intercollegiate athletic ladder. In the last two years Montclair State has been a participant in the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Eastern College Division basketball tournament.

Montclair State completed its regular season with eight wins in nine games. The lone defeat was at the hands of Central Connecticut State in the fourth contest of the season. The Blue Devils downed the Indians, 18-14.

Anderson's team won its second straight New Jersey State College Conference this year, and are currently second in the Eastern Football Conference behind Central Connecticut State.

Anderson, who has a two year mark of 16 wins and 3 losses at Montclair State, has turned in a sensational rebuilding job in his short tenure with the Indians.

Montclair State won only two of nine contests in 1968 and had not had a winning season since 1964 when Anderson came upon the scene. The former Colgate All-American, who has never coached a loser in 29 years as a head coach, led the Indians to an 8-2 mark last year and won the last five games in a row.

This year the Indians started slowly winning three of the first four games mostly on defense. After the four point defeat at the hands of Central Connecticut State, Anderson's offense came into its own and the Essex County college roared through the last five opponents.

In the last three games the Indians past Trenton State, 47-0, Jersey City State 21-7 and Glassboro State, 45-0.

The Montclair State offense is built around two of the best College Division runners in the East in fullback Tony Valpone, who has rushed for 1868 yards in three years with the Indians, led the team with 880 yards this year.

Morschauser, bothered by bad ribs for nearly half the season, scored eight touchdowns in the last three games and finished with 13TD's and 78 points, Both set new single season all-time records.

The Montclair State line is led by tackles Al Avignone and Jeff Scheetz.

Anderson has rotated his quarterbacks for most of the season using Bob Brewster, Ron Gara and Bob Cosentino. Gara was hurt in the Southern Connecticut State game and has not played since because of a shoulder separation.

The defense, led by Pete Contaldi, a Little All-American candidate at linebacker, has allowed only 45 points in nine contests. Only Central Connecticut scored more than one touchdown against the hard nosed MSC defenders.

Tom Testa, who played under Anderson at Montclair High School and later served as head coach at Belleville High School, handles the Indians defensive unit. Much like Anderson, Testa is a man of few words who has the ability to get the best out of his players.

While the Indians will have to wait to see who their opponent will be in the big seashore hall Anderson wasted little time and the Indians went back to the practice field yesterday.

ATLANTIC CITY, NEW JERSEY---Montclair State College makes its debut in postseason football competition here indoors at Convention Hall Saturday (November 28th) meeting Hampden-Sydney of Virginia in the second annual Knute Rockne Bowl. Kickoff time is 2:30 P.M.

Coach Clary Anderson's eleven enters the Rockne game with a record of eight wins and one loss. The Indians have won five contests in a row since losing to Central Connecticut State, 18-14.

The Indians have showed marked improvement in the second half of the season and should be in the best condition of the year for the big clash with the Mason-Dixon Conference champions.

Anderson, the man who has lifted the Indians from a loser into one of the top College Division elevens in the United States, plans no major changes for the Rockne contest.

The Indians offensive strength is its ground game led by fullback Tony Valpone, a 215 pound senior from Somerset (N.J.), and Glen Morschauser, 190 pound junior from Paramus (N.J.)

Valpone, extremely quick off the mark and noted for his outstanding second effort after being tackled, is Montclair State's top rusher with 880 yards on 187 carries for a fine 4.7 yards per carry average.

The former Franklin Township High School star is already the Indians all-time career rushing record holder with 1886 yards.. This year he set a new single game rushing mark of 192 yards on 31 carries against Jersey City State.

Morschauser is the Indians top scorer with 13 touchdowns good for 78 points. Both are MSC all-time records.

The Indians starting quarterback will be Bob Brewster, a junior from Westfield (N.J.)

Brewster has started the last four games since Ron Gara was sidelined with a shoulder separation. Brewster has completed 25 of 50 attempts good for 273 yards and two touchdowns.

The Indians quarterback also handles kicking duties for Montclair State. He has made 28 of 33 extra point tries and three of ten field goals.

Rounding out the starting backfield will be sophomore Parker Snare or junior Al Thompson.

The Indians offensive line is solid from end to end and is led by guard Al Avignone, a senior from Clifton.

Avignone, a 210 pounder, is as finer offensive blocker as you can find on the College Division level. Scheetz, who has professional football size at 6-4 and 230 pounds, did not play in the first four games of the year and his return gave the Indians a much needed lift.

Roland Kascher, who is playing his four year of varsity ball, and Don Whiteman, a fine sophomore, are the ends with Jim Magnatta, a junior, playing opposite Scheetz at tackle

John Bellavia a fine guard is paired with Avignone while Rich Jones is the center.

Defense, which is the Indians trump card, is led by Little All-American candidate, linebacker Pete Contaldi of Bayonne (N.J.). Anderson, a man not given to lavish praise, has called the junior linebacker "a player who could perform on any team in the nation, large or small.

The Indians defense has yielded only 45 points in nine games with 18 coming in the loss to Central Connecticut State. In seven of the nine contests played by Montclair State this year the opposition has been held to under 100 yard net rushing.

The Indians front five is a veteran unit anchored by defensive end Mike Van Zile, a junior from Butler (N.J.).

Joining Van Zile up front are tackles Bob Davis and Rich Dinsmore, middle guard Tom D'Onofrio and defensive end Bob Rusignuolo.

Contaldi's partner at linebacker is Bob Jensen, a junior from Union City (N.J.).

The Indians secondary is another all-veteran unit that has picked off 21 opposition aeriels this year. At the cornerback positions are John Brunelli of Palisades Park (N.J.) and Joe Kostecki of Scotch Plains (N.J.) while Alex Kaplanovich of Clifton (N.J.) and Lonnie Moncelsi of Nutley (N.J.) will be the safetyman. While bowl action will be new to all the other Indians, Moncelsi is playing in his second postseason contest.

The former Nutley High School star was a regular two years ago with Penn State when the Mittney Lions performed in the Orange Bowl.

Under Anderson's able direction this year the Indians have made steady progress and should be ready for the big test on Saturday. While the defense did the job in the early stages of the campaign, the offense in the last five contests has come into its own to give MSC a balanced attack.

Clary Anderson of Montclair and Jack Stephans of Jersey City have been named football co-coaches of the year in the New Jersey State College Athletic Conference. The NJSCAC's four grid head coaches were responsible for the voting.

Anderson, who in two seasons has built Montclair into one of the East's top small college powers, led the Indians to a 9-1 record, the school's best since the 1964 undefeated team.

Montclair won the NJSCAC for the second season in a row and also defeated Hampden-Sydney, 7-6, in the Knute Rockne Bowl in Atlantic City. It was Montclair's first appearance ever in a post-season bowl game.

Anderson's two-year record is an eye-popping 17-3. He came to Montclair State in the fall of 1969 after compiling one of the most remarkable won-loss records in national scholastic coaching history as a football and baseball mentor at Montclair High School.

As an undergraduate, Anderson was a star lineman at Colgate University, earning All-East and All-America honors. Colgate teams won 24 and lost only two during Anderson's playing career under Andy Kerr.

As a schoolboy football coach, Anderson had a 27-year record of 209-23-1, including 12 undefeated seasons, 14 state championships and 19 sectional titles.

Ironically, Stephans was a line coach at Montclair State in 1964 and 1965 after a collegiate playing career as a center and linebacker at Boston University.

Glassboro - Jersey City - Montclair - Newark - Paterson - Trenton

Stephans coached one season at St. Joseph's Regional in Montvale, compiling a 7-2 record, and has been head coach at Jersey City State the last five, including the first two as head of the club program.

Including the two club teams, Stephans has an overall mark of 31-11. His 1970 Gothic team, which finished third behind Montclair and Glassboro in the NJSCAC, posted a 5-3 log.

"I'm very happy, because it's always nice to be considered by the men you are associated with, but I sincerely believe Clary Anderson deserved the honor," Stephans said.

Montclair State College, which rolled to its second consecutive New Jersey State College Athletic Conference football championship and then capped a brilliant 9-1 season with a triumph in the Knute Rockne Bowl, dominates the NJSCAC all-star team.

The Clary Anderson-coached Indians placed six players on the 13-man offensive team (there were ties at two positions) and five on the 11-man defensive squad. Runnerup Glassboro and Jersey City had six all-stars each, and Trenton settled for one berth.

The conference's four head coaches were responsible for the voting.

Fullback Tony Valpone, halfback Glen Morchauser and quarterback Bob Brewster were Montclair's representatives in the offensive backfield, with Brewster sharing the QB job with Glassboro's Bill Hyatt. Bill Byrne of Jersey City is the all-star flanker.

Other Montclair players picked for the offensive unit were tackles James Magnatta and Jeff Scheetz and guard Al Avignone. End Howard Heatherly, tackle Harry Kickey and center Charles Tybersky made it from Jersey City, and end Frank Magill and guard Phil Petite from Glassboro.

There were three offensive tackles chosen because of ties in voting.

Defensively, Montclair placed tackle Bob Davis, middle guard Tom D'Onofrio, linebacker Pete Contaldi and halfbacks Orlando Moncelsi and Alex Kaplanovich.

Glassboro - Jersey City - Montclair - Newark - Paterson - Trenton

Glassboro put three on the defensive team (end George Maxwell, tackle Mario Harris and halfback Gene Griego), Jersey City two (end Mike Guerieri and linebacker Tom Shipman) and Trenton one (halfback Doug O'Connell).

Valpone, Morchauser, Scheetz, Petite and Hyatt were repeaters from the 1969 offensive all-star team, and Harris, Contaldi and Shipman repeated on defense.

Montclair lost only to Central Connecticut (18-14) while compiling the school's best record since 1964. The Indians nudged Hampden-Sydney, 7-6, at Atlantic City Convention Hall to win the Knute Rockne Bowl in Montclair's first bowl appearance ever.

Dear Tony and Peter:

I am writing to congratulate you and all of the other members of the football team on your highly successful season, especially winning the Knute Rockne Bowl. Everyone at the College is exceedingly proud of the team, not only because you were the "winningest" team in college history, but also because of the sportsmanship and team-play which was evident throughout all of the games.

At their last meeting the Board of Trustees unani-
