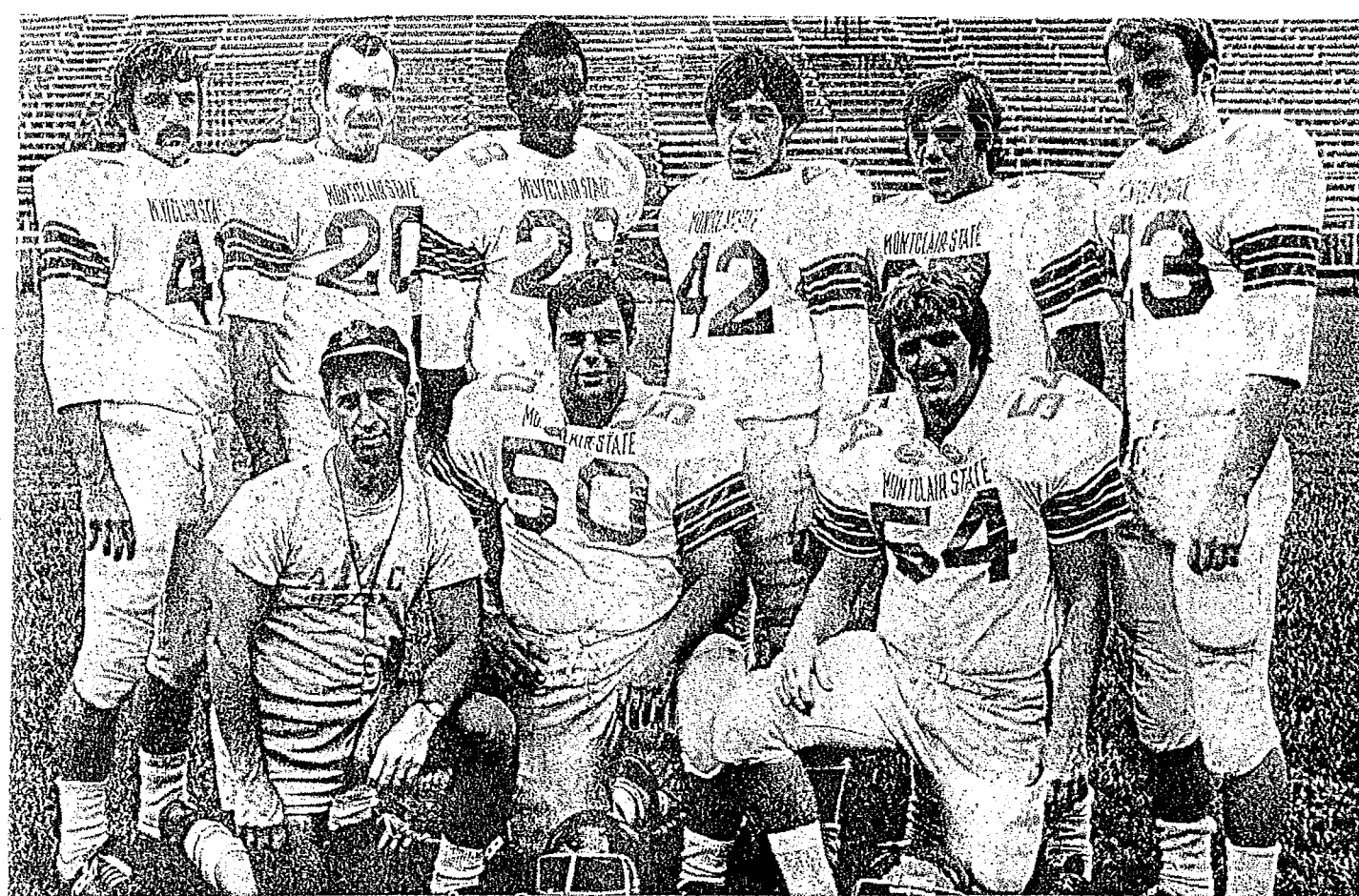

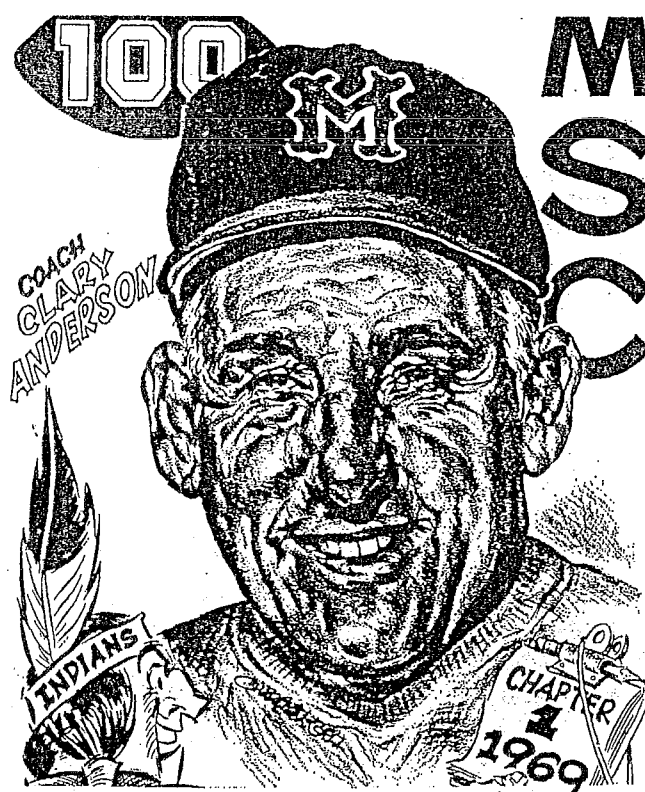

CLARY ANDERSON, HEAD COACH

It would be difficult, perhaps impossible, to find a man who has enjoyed the overwhelming success of Clary Anderson in sports. As a player on the scholastic, college and professional level he never played on a losing team. As a coach for more than 25 years he had unparalleled success in football, baseball, basketball, ice hockey and swimming.

Last year, Anderson's first at Montclair State, he led the football team to a great comeback mark of eight wins and two losses. Montclair won the New Jersey State College Conference championship. In the Eastern Football Conference, the Indians changed from doormat to contender by finishing a strong second. In the NCAA College Division, Montclair State ranked seventh in total defense and eighth in rushing defense. Montclair ranked fifth in the East in the Lambert Bowl ratings.

Clary was an All-State fullback at Montclair High School in 1929. Upon graduation in 1930, he attended Cook Academy before entering Colgate University. Playing football under the late Andy Kerr, Anderson was a standout for three seasons receiving All-East and All-American recognition. The Red Raiders posted marks of 9-0, 8-1 and 7-1. The loss in 1933 was to Tulane, 7-0 at Yankee Stadium, and in 1934 the loss was at Ohio State 10-7. Anderson played both quarterback and fullback and was co-captain with his roommate, Jack Fritas, also of Montclair.

In the 27 scholastic years Anderson coached football at Blair Academy and at Montclair High School, he enjoyed 12 undefeated seasons, 14 state championships and 19 sectional titles. The scholastic record was 209-23-1.

Anderson can be particularly proud of many of his products. Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin, famed astronaut who walked on the moon, was the center on Clary's undefeated 1946 team. Aubrey Lewis, once a world record holder, is vice-president of F. W. Woolworth Co. John Emery, winner of the Poe award at Princeton, is Vice President of McGraw-Hill. Royce Flippin (Princeton), Joe Fortunato (Yale) Dave McKelvey (Cornell) and Sandy Sand (Delaware) were football captains. Mike Nichols and Warren Rauhofer are airline captains today. Hollie Donan was an All-American tackle at Princeton. Jay Johnson, Garvie Craw, Larry Hubbard, Bill Byrne, Ron Burton, and Lewis played pro football. Bert Stiff, Dick Emery, Tom Wilson, John Tyson, Ben Mobley and Rusty Garthwaite played for outstanding college teams. In basketball, Butch van Brada-Kolff is coaching the Detroit Pistons. Wally Choice (Indiana), Nick Pond (North Carolina State), Whitey Fulcomer (Princeton) and Harry Zingg and Gerry Samuels (Vermont) captained their college basketball teams. "Gus" Keriazakos, Royce Flippin, Aubrey Lewis, Richie Haines and Len Coleman were all selected by the Newark A.C. and Newark Boy's Club as the outstanding athlete in the state.

Anderson also coached many outstanding players in semipro and summer college league and service baseball. These include John Podres, John Kucks, Turk Farrell, Dick Sisler, John Berardino and Bob Scheffing — the Mets' general manager.

Recent Montclair State graduate Dan Rodgers is placekicking for the Jersey Jays. Hard hitting Frank Rossi has signed with the baseball Yankees and will report when his military obligations permit.

During World War II, Anderson served four years in the U.S. Naval Air Corps and reached the rank of lieutenant-commander.

Anderson is married to the former Claire Louise Aubrey. The Andersons are parents of a daughter, Susan, a senior, and the head girl cheerleader at Cornell. The MSC coach makes his home in Montclair.

**DONALD MacKAY**  
Defensive Coach

Now in his second season with the MSC staff, MacKay works with the defensive team during the week, scouts opponents and also fills the role of chief administrative assistant to Coach Clary Anderson.

The Massachusetts native was an assistant coach at Ridgewood (N.J.) High School for two years prior to his switch to Montclair State. Before that, he had earned his varsity letter as a tackle for three years at the University of Massachusetts after serving in the Marine Corps for four years.

MacKay, who has a B.S. and master's degree from Massachusetts, resides in Waldwick (N.J.) with his wife Priscilla and his two sons, Duncan, 8, and David, 5.

**TIMOTHY (TIM) SULLIVAN**  
Offensive Line Coach

One time MSC opponent as a player and then coach, Sullivan will be instructing the offensive linemen for the fourth season.

The Brooklyn native previously had assisted in football and wrestling at Ithaca College while earning his master's degree. He had played against MSC as an undergraduate at Cortland (N.Y.) State where he won letters in wrestling and lacrosse as well as football.

Graduation from Cortland was followed by a year at Tappan Zee (N.Y.) High School as head wrestling and assistant football coach. Then it was off to Ithaca for his master's degree and subsequently, in 1967, he joined the Montclair State College staff.

Sullivan also coaches the wrestling squad and in three years has posted a record of 29 victories and only 10 defeats.

Married and the father of Virginia, 6, and Timothy, Jr., 3, Sullivan is a resident of Little Falls (N.J.).

**TOM TESTA**  
Defensive Coach

Much of the credit for a defense which held opponents without a touchdown through the last five games last season must go to Testa, who was in his first campaign with the varsity after successfully piloting the 1968 freshman club.

Under Testa's "hit-or-sit" policy, the defense responded with four shut-outs, three of them during the late season surge when MSC won six straight. From a points-yield of 179 in 1968, the figure dropped to 88 last fall, an impressive turnabout.

Testa's success with the varsity defense followed a 4-1 record with MSC's first freshman team in history and a five-year mark of 31-12-2 as head coach at Belleville (N.J.) High School. His 1962 Bellboys edition was 8-1, the best record by a Belleville team in 33 years, and he was named Essex County's Coach of the Year for his achievement.

The varsity assignment with MSC reunites Testa with Clary Anderson under whom he played on two Montclair High School state championship teams in 1950-51. Married to the former Christine Caruso, Testa is the father of a girl, Carolyn, 15, and two boys, Thomas, 13, and Edward, 10.

# Montclair Begins Workouts With 73 Players Turning Out

MONTCLAIR — Montclair State College's defending New Jersey State College Conference champions opened pre-season drills at Sprague Field yesterday with 73 candidates greeting Coach Clary Anderson.

Twenty-five lettermen were among the opening-day squad as Montclair began its 40th season of intercollegiate football.

Anderson turned in one of the nation's outstanding coaching jobs last year in his initial season with the Indians. The former Montclair High School mentor took the 1968 record of 2-7 and turned it into a fine 8-2 mark.

In addition to taking the NJSCC title, Montclair State turned in its best showing in the Eastern Football Conference with a strong second-place finish.

Many of last year's stars were on hand yesterday as Anderson and his staff started three days of practice in shorts and football shoes.

On the offensive side, Anderson's one-two punch on the ground, senior fullback Tony Valpone of Somerset and junior halfback Glen Morschauser of Paramus are returning along with Little All-American tight end Roland Kascher of Westwood.

Valpone, who topped the Indians last season in rushing with 668 yards for a 4.2 average, and Morschauser, who tallied 10 touchdowns and gained 600 yards, are two of the finest college division runners in the East.

## Kascher Caught 32

Kascher, 6-2 and 208 pounds, set an all-time reception record last year by catching 32 passes for 444 yards and five touchdowns.

One discomfiting note for Anderson was the loss of the Cooper brothers from North Arlington. Both fine runners, the Coopers are foregoing football for different reasons.

Don Cooper, who is getting married, was an able backup man to Morschauser last year and gained 494 yards, scoring three touchdowns. His brother Bruce, a sophomore, was a stand-out on the freshmen team but is not returning to school this fall.

Anderson's chief problem is to find a replacement for departed quarterback Bill Kulikowski. A battle appears likely among juniors, Bob Brewster of Westfield and Ron Gara of Somerville, and sophomore Bob Cosentino of Union.

Only two holes have to be filled on the Indians' defensive unit which was unscored upon in the last five games of last season. Orland Moncelst, a transfer student from Penn State, was most impressive in opening-day drills and could take away one of the starting defensive backfield positions.

The Indians will drill twice a day at Sprague Field through Saturday before moving to Blair Academy in Blairstown, for a week of sessions.

Anderson, who has never had a losing football season in 28 years on the high school and college level, was pleased with the workouts but cautious. "We have plenty of work to do before the East Stroudsburg State game on Sept. 19, but if today's drills are any indication, the squad looks ready for all the work we can give out," the Indian coach said.

# Montclair State Prepares For Opener Saturday Night

**P P E R MONTCLAIR** — Montclair State College began final week of the preseason ball training period yesterday for its opener Saturday at Sprague Field against

East Stroudsburg State. Kick-off time is 8 p.m.

Last Saturday night the Indians engaged in a full game scrimmage against Nassau Community College and won

28-10. Trailing 10-0 at half-time, coach Clary Anderson's eleven roared back with 28 points in the second half to win.

Glen Morschauer, last year's top scorer with 10 touchdowns, tallied twice on runs of 80 and 6 yards. Morschauer's 80-yard dash came on the second play of the third period.

MSC's other scores came on an 18-yard pass play from quarterback Ron Gara to half-back Parker Snare and a 3-yard roll-out by reserve signal caller Bob Costantino.

Bob Brewster, the Indians' extra point kicker, converted after each score.

Van Zile, former Butler High School star, had an outstanding game against Nassau, dumping the Long Islanders' quarterback five times.

Anderson expressed satisfaction with the scrimmage although he thought the play in the first period was sluggish.

## Wild Game

East Stroudsburg State lost its opener in a wild aerial contest with Lafayette, 27-17, on Saturday. The Warriors' pint-sized quarterback, Steve Mummaw, set a school completion and attempt record in the game with 33 completions in 57 attempts for 353 yards and two touchdowns.

Montclair coaches Don McKay and Tom Testa scouted East Stroudsburg and came back with a glowing report on the 5-8 Mummaw. Montclair State's front five, Mike Van Zile, Bill Trimmer, Tom Rothacker, Richard Dinsmore and Tom D'Onofrio are going to have a busy eve-

ning putting a rush on Mummaw.

The secondary will also have to play outstanding ball for Montclair to win. The all veteran group, which has been aided by the addition of Lonnie Monceli, who started for Penn State in the Orange Bowl two years ago, picked off 19 enemy aerials and should have the opportunity to get an outstanding start on that record.

The Indians enter the contest with a five-game winning streak built up in the last half of the 1969 season.

# Montclair State Breezes In Season Opener, 16-6

## UPPER MONTCLAIR

With its defensive unit dominating the contest, Montclair State College opened its 40th intercollegiate football season before 6,818 fans Saturday night downing East Stroudsburg State, 16-6.

The invading Warriors had drawn national attention a week ago in piling up 520 yards against Lafayette and the contest had been billed as a classic battle—high powered offense against ironclad defense, but it failed to come off.

With defensive end Mike Van Zile and linebacker Pete Contaldi keeping constant pressure on quarterback Steve Mummaw, East Stroudsburg State gained only 63 net yards in the game.

Mummaw, who put on a gritty performance under a heavy pass rush, completed eight of 24 passes. He was dumped seven times with Van Zile getting credit for three tackles and John Brunelli 3 ints.

While the Indians defense sparkled, coach Clary Anderson's offense did the job but was not sparkling.

Montclair State got on the scoreboard with 12 minutes left in the second period when halfback Parker Snare, a promising sophomore from Annandale, ripped off a 16-yard end sweep to score. The talented halfback did a tight

rope act down the right sideline on the run. Bob Brewster converted and the Indians led, 7-0.

The home team added three more points in the second period when Brewster booted a 25-yard field goal after an Indians drive ran out of gas on the East Stroudsburg State 15-yard line.

East Stroudsburg State only had the football for 22 plays in the second half, but the Indians added only one more touchdown.

Quarterback Ron Gara climaxed a 57-yard TD march when he slammed over from the Warriors' one. A poor pass from center caused Brewster to miss the extra point try.

## Costly Fumble

East Stroudsburg State got on the scoreboard when defensive end Joe Vancho picked off a Gara fumble in midair and raced 75 yards to paydirt.

Anderson now in his 29th season as a head coach kept his record intact of never having lost an opening game. It was the second straight victory over East Stroudsburg State in as many years.

Van Zile was out of this world as a punter. The talented kicker had a brilliant 48-yard average and boomed one 70-yards for his single game high.

The Montclair State football program saluted the late Vince Lombardi and its regular series on outstanding high school coaches spotlighted Don Ahern of Bayonne.

The Indians will return to action Saturday night when they host Delaware State in what shapes up as a grudge match. The Hornets were one of the two teams that inflicted a loss on Montclair State last year. Game time will be 8 p.m.

# Montclair State Defeats Hornets

UPPER MONTCLAIR — Driving 62 yards on eight plays late in the fourth period, Montclair State extended its two-year winning streak in football, seven games here at Sprague field last night before 5,828 fans, downing Delaware State, 7-0.

The Indians' winning touchdown came on a 15-yard pass from quarterback Ron Gara to halfback Glen Morschauser. The former Paramus High School star made a sensational over-the-head catch on the Delaware State eight-yard line and then feinted two Hornet defenders on his way to the end zone. Bob Brewster converted after the score.

The Indians' other points came on a first-period field goal of 29 yards by Brewster.

Along with Morschauser and Brewster, the MSC defensive unit were keys to the important victory. Delaware State gained only 59 yards on the ground against the Indians' strong defense. In the air, the Hornets got 146 yards on 11 completions in 23 attempts.

Delaware State got its only TD in the third period when halfback Steve Davis took a quick pitch and raced 21 yards for a score. Dwight Boney converted.

MSC is now 2-0 this year while Delaware State is 1-1 after having beaten Lock Haven State.

# MSC Powders

## Curry, 35-0

MILTON, Mass. — Scoring all its points in the last three periods, Montclair State College yesterday rolled to its third straight football victory without a defeat, romping over Curry, 35-0.

The win was the eighth straight for coach Clary Anderson's Indians over the last two years. Curry suffered its first loss after two victories.

Glen Morschauser, the Indians' talented halfback from Paramus, N. J., was the scoring star for the visitors with two touchdowns. It was Morschauser's third to this season and 13th of his career at Montclair State.

The Indians' other scores came on a 33-yard pass from quarterback Ron Gara to halfback John Pello, a three-yard run by fullback Tony Valpone and a 35-yard run with a pass interception by linebacker Pete Contaldi.

Montclair State marched 49 yards in 13 plays for its first touchdown with Morschauser covering the last three on an off-tackle slant. Bob Brewster kicked the first of five consecutive conversions.

Later in the second period, the Indians drove 65 yards in six plays for a second score. Gara tossed a sensational 33-yard scoring strike to Pello in the Curry end zone for the score.

Contaldi, who played another sensational game at linebacker, set up the third Indian TD when he picked off a pass by Curry quarterback Joe Carabba on the Colonels' 13-yard line and returned it to the nine. Morschauser went over for the touchdown on the next play from the Curry nine.

Another pass interception, this time by halfback Lonnie Moncelis on the Montclair State five-yard line, set the stage for the fourth Montclair State touchdown. Marching 95 yards in 17 plays, the Indians got on the scoreboard when Valpone crashed over from the Curry three.

The final score came in the fourth period when Contaldi picked off a pass on the Curry 35-yard line and dashed down the sideline for a TD.

The Indians' defense was outstanding, giving up only 79 yards. Curry had a minus 21 yards rushing against the Indians' vaunted front five.

Mike Van Zile, who ranked second in the nation last week according to National Collegiate Athletic Association figures, helped the MSC cause with another brilliant day. His four punts were good for 213 yards, a 53.3 average.

The three pass interceptions give the Indian defense a total of nine for the young season. The all-time MSC record is 19.

Montclair State opens its bid for the Eastern Football Conference championship next week at Central Connecticut State in New Britain.

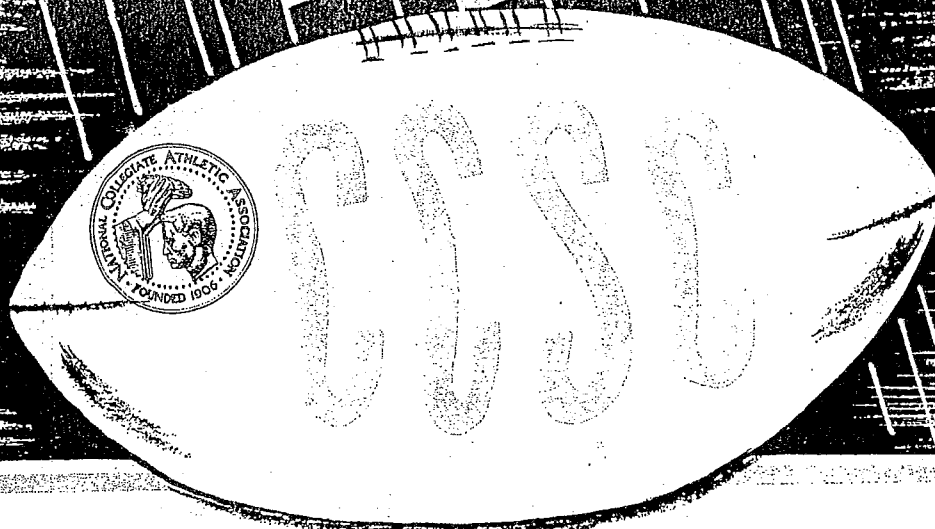

# Central Conn. Ends 8-Game MSC Skein

NEW BRITAIN, Conn. — Montclair State College's eight-game winning streak over the last two years ended here at Arute Field yesterday as Central Connecticut State won its second straight Eastern Football Conference game, downing the Indians, 18-14.

The loss was the first for Coach Clary Anderson's this season after three wins. Montclair State's mark is now 0-1 in the EFC.

Central Connecticut, which came from behind after spotting the Indians a 7-0 lead, has won two games in the conference and is unbeaten in three games this season.

The Indians' defeat was traceable to their inability to move that ball. With the exception of the first-period drive and a 96-yard march in the final moments of the game, MSC had no offense.

Defensive halfback John

Brunelli set up the MSC touchdown in the first period when he recovered a Central Connecticut State fumble on the home eleven's 15-yard line.

Two line plays netted only two yards and a five-yard penalty moved the Indians back to the 15. On third down, quarterback Bob Brewster threw a strike to end Roland Kascher just under the goalposts for a TD. Brewster converted and the Indians led 7-0.

The fumbling of a fourth-down pass from center on a punt set up Central Connecticut first points in the second period. Punter Mike Van Zile attempted to run with the low pass but was inches short on the Indians' 30.

The Montclair State defense threw the Blue Devils back after they advanced to the three, but Norman Davidson booted a 25-yard field goal to make the score 7 to 3 at half-time.

Central Connecticut scored in the third period on a 64-yard march in 15 plays. The TD came on a six-yard pass from quarterback Dale Finch to John Magaletta.

In the fourth period, the Blue Devils went 80 yards on 12 plays for a second TD. The touchdown came on a freak play with Pete Siran recover-

ing a fumble that was booted from the Montclair State nine-yard line to the end zone for six points.

Montclair State went 96 yards in seven plays, five via the air route, for a final score in the fourth period. Brewster's pass from the five-yard line was deflected by a Blue Devil linesman into fullback Tony Valpone's hands who raced over for the score.

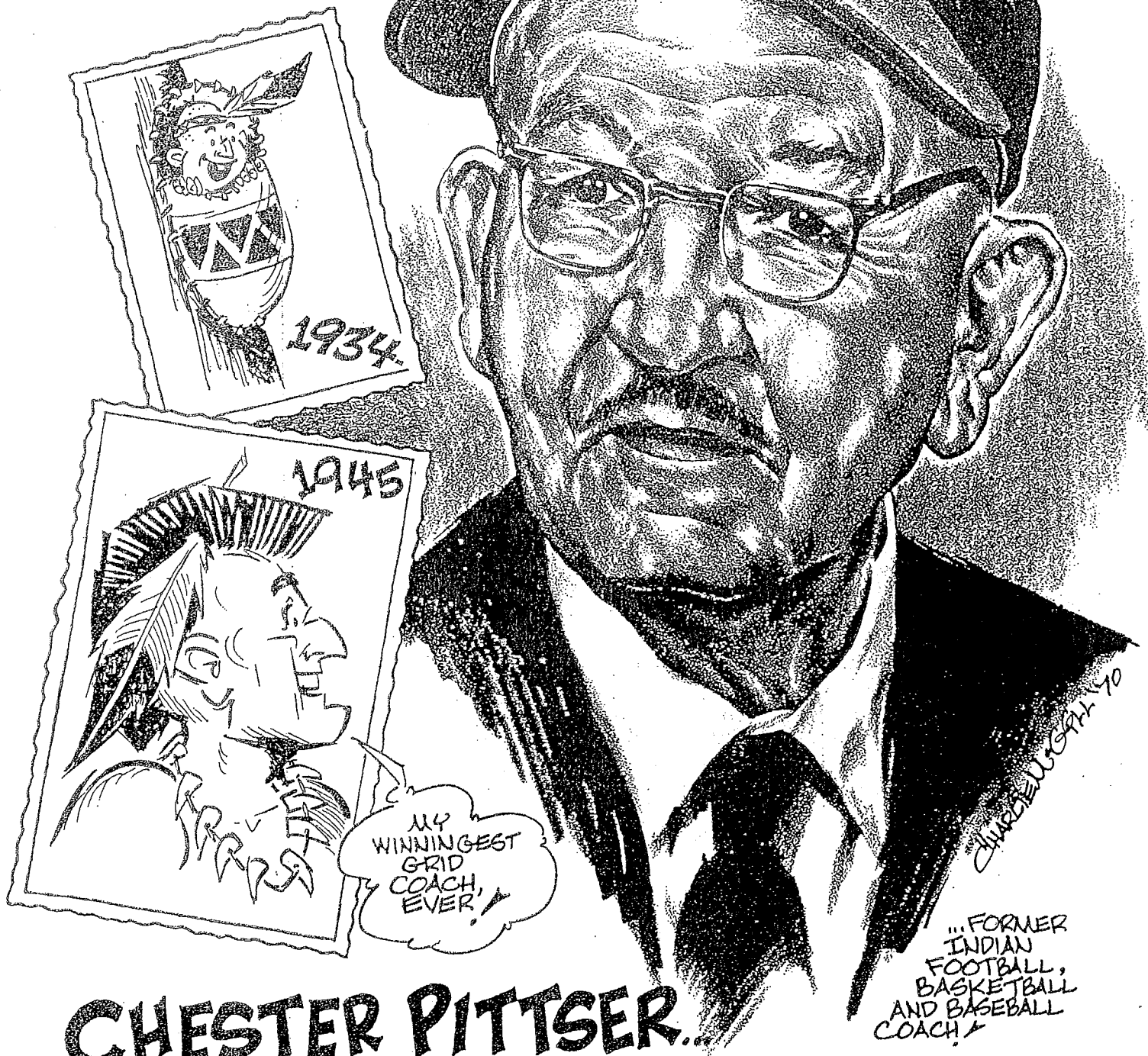

### Montclair Triumphs

UPPER MONTCLAIR — With its defensive unit again turning the tide, Montclair State College gained its fourth victory in five starts last night before 6,212 fans in an Eastern Football League Conference game, downing the University of Bridgeport, 21-0.

Coach Clary Anderson's Indians got on the scoreboard only once in the first half, marching 71 yards in nine plays with halfback Glen Morschauer of Paramus skirting right end from the Bridgeport five-yard line for the touchdown. Bob Brewster kicked the first of three successful placements.

The Montclair State offense did not get going again until midway the fourth period when the home team traveled 18 yards in three plays for its second TD of the game. Fullback Tony Valpone slammed over tackle from the one-yard-line for the score.

Late in the final period, after defensive halfback John Brunelli of Palisade Park had intercepted his second pass of the game and returned it to the Bridgeport 28, the Indians tallied in two plays with the score coming on a 17-yard pass from reserve quarterback Bob Consentino to halfback John Dally of Lyndhurst.

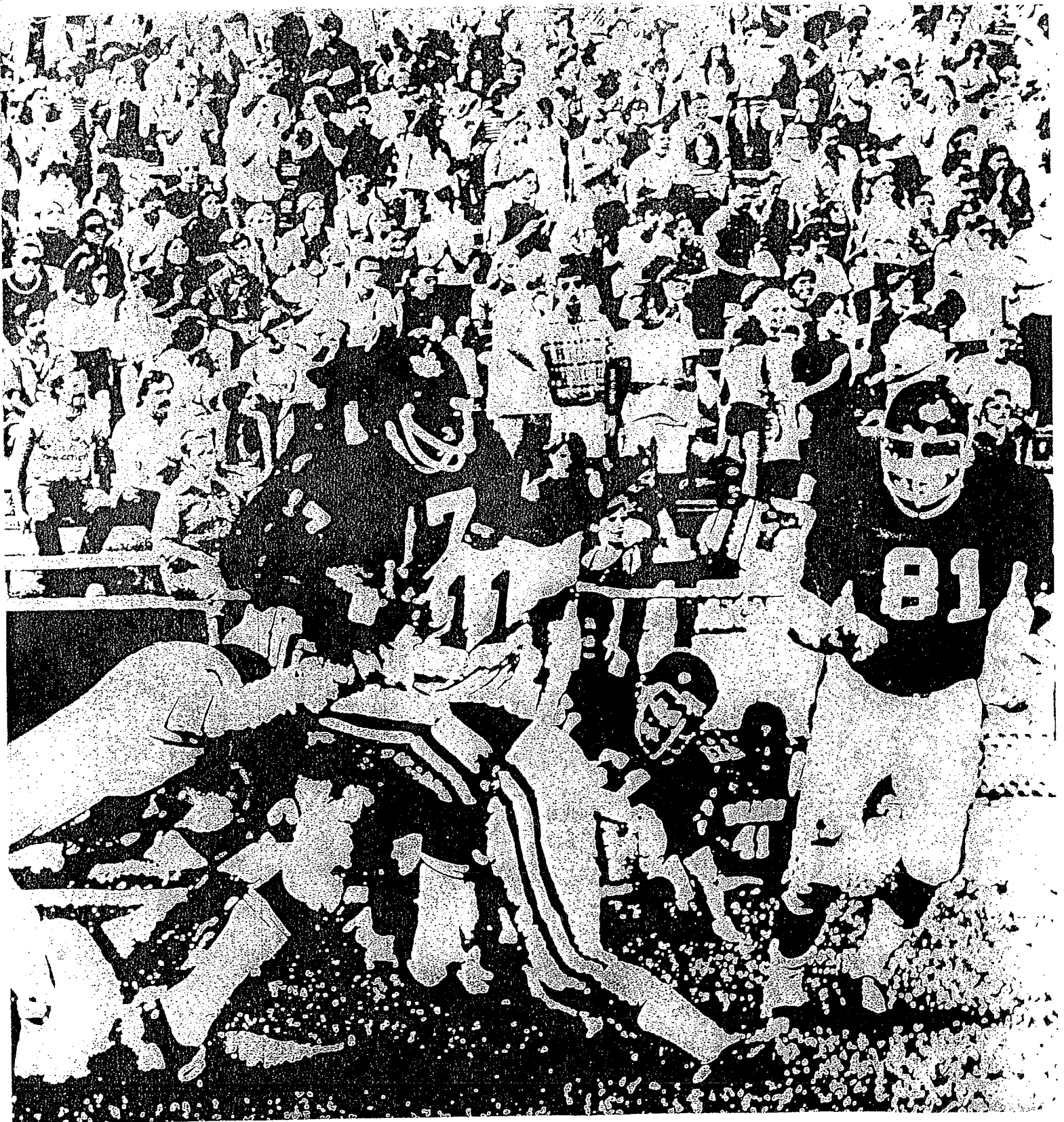

# Montclair State Turns Back Owls, 38-7

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — Displaying its best offense of the season, Montclair State College scored its fifth victory in six starts here at Bowen Field yesterday in the Eastern Football Conference, downing Southern Connecticut State, 38-7.

Leading only 10-7 at halftime, Coach Clary Anderson's Indians scored four times in the second half to turn the game into a rout.

The Indians' defensive unit turned the tide of battle in the second half, recovering two fumbles and blocking an Owl punt, that set up three quick scores.

Southern Connecticut State took a 7-0 lead in the first quarter when fullback Gordon Taylor tallied on a 40-yard trap play up the middle. Larry Kimball converted from placement and a 7-0 lead.

Montclair State's first points came on a 36-yard field goal by Bob Brewster in the second quarter. The Indians moved ahead to stay on a 67-yard march that took just five plays. The big gainer was a 45-yard pass from quarterback Ron Gara to halfback John Dally to the Owls' nine-yard line. Fullback Tony Valpone, who had the best scoring day of his career, caught a nine-yard pass from Gara for the touchdown. Brewster kicked the first of five consecutive extra points to put the Indians up, 10-7, at halftime.

Montclair State got on the scoreboard quickly in the third period after a poor pass from center caused punter Kimball to fall on the ball on his six-yard line. Glen Morschauer went over on fourth down from the one.

Defensive halfback Alex Kaplanovich set up the second TD for the Indians in the third period when he recovered a fumble on the home team's 34. Valpone carried four times and blasted his way into the end zone from the 13-yard line.

A blocked punt by linebacker Jim Pondillo gave Montclair State the ball on the Southern Connecticut State 11-yard line in the fourth period. Valpone went over from the one. The final TD came on a 59-yard march on five plays with Greg White passing 40 yards to Guy Bonnano.

NEW HAVEN — Montclair State and Southern Connecticut State, each with just one loss, battle in a key Eastern Football Conference clash tomorrow at Bowen Field.

The Indians of Clary Anderson are 4-1, coming off a 21-0 victory over Bridgeport. Montclair's offense, dormant for most of the season, began to show some spark last week as soph quarterback Bob Cosentino, inserted into the lineup in the fourth quarter, completed four of eight passes, including a 17-yard touchdown to John Dally. Cosentino, a

scrambler, can add some yardage on the ground, too, and teams with the Indians' top running duo of Glen Morschauer of Paramus and Tony Valpone.

Montclair's defensive unit still ranks on top in Eastern collegiate circles, and now has 12 interceptions, just seven short of the school record set last year. John Brunelli is the individual leader with five, just one short of the Indian mark set in 1966 by Ron Pourro.

The Owls are 3-1, having beaten Maine Maritime, Bridgeport, and Glassboro State while losing to Hofstra, 34-3. Southern Connecticut holds a 7-4 edge in the series, although Montclair rolled last year, 41-0.

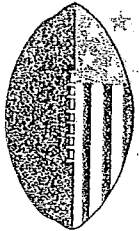
