

Powerful Montclair State, fresh from its 47-0 shell of Trenton State, unleashed a relentless ground attack a Jack Stephens' Jersey City State gridders before 3,006 last night at Bayonne's Veteran Stadium, piling a net of 303 rushing for a 21-7 victory.

Workhorse Gen Morchauser scored all three touchdow

It was Montclair State's seventh win in eight decisions this season and its second straight against no losses in the New Jersey College Conference race. The stage is now set for the Conference title game next Saturday at Glassboro where the Indians meet home team Glassboro. In an identical situation last year Montclair beat Glassboro 23-13 for the state crown.

Donn Byrne scored the lone Gothic TD, taking an eight-yard pass from quarterback John Manzi after Don Dickerson had set up the field position via 73-yard run on a fake punt play. Jersey City is now 4-3 on the season and has completed its NJ Conference schedule with a 1-2 mark.




Jersey City tightened its defenses and the teams went into the midpoint respite with the score still 7-0.

# MSC Has Winning Coach

ATLANTIC CITY - Mont-clair State College's trip to the annual Knute Rockne Bowl at Covention Hall Saturday will mark the school's first appearance ever in a postseason football game. But football success is nothing new for Indians' coach Clary Anderson.

Anderson, who came to Montclair State in 1969, is one of the most successful men-. tors in the history of New Jersey high school football. In 25 years at Montclair High School, Anderson never had a losing season and posted an unbelievable mark of 197 wins, 22 losses and five ties.

Previous to Montclair High, the former Colgate all-American was head coach at Blair Academy and was 12-1-1. The combined records give Clary a 209-23-6 mark.

The Indians had fallen on evil days in recent years and were 2-7 in 1968, just before Anderson's arrival, and had not had a winning record since 1964.

The Anderson magical touch made Montclair State an instant winner. The Indians finished with eight wins and only two defeats and captured the New Jersey State College Conference championship for the first time.

Basic football coach who stresses blocking and tackling, Anderson moved the Indians through the final five games of 1969 without a loss.

This year the Indians took the first three contests and won decisions over such well-regarded teams as East Stroudsburg State and Delaware State.

Delaware State, boasting of several outstanding pro prospects, is ranked first in the country in the college division in rushing and total defense.

After the four-point loss to Central Connecticut State, the Indians picked up steam and won the last five games of the season to finish 8-1.

This season the Indians roared through the last five games like a run-away ex-press train, beating University of Bridgeport, 21-0, Southern Connecticut S ta te 38-7. Trenton State 47-0, Jersey City State, 21-7 and played a near perfect contest in trouncing Glassboro State, 45-0.

Montclair has a wellrounded team which puts emphasis on a ground game. In fullback Tony Valpone of Somerset, a 215-pound blockbus-

ter, and halfback Glen Morschauser, a 190-pound swifty from Paramus, Anderson has developed two of the best college division runners in the

Valpone has been the leading rusher for MSC this year with 880 net yards on 187 carries for an average of 4.7 yards per carry. A senior, Valpone is the Indians' alltime rushing record-holder. with 1,886 yards. Against Jersey City State, he set a new single game record of 192 yards.

The Indians star needs only 36 yards in the Rockne Bowl to establish a new single season rushing mark. The present mark is 915 yards.

Morschauser, a junior, has already set a new single season record for touchdowns scored with 13, and has a career mark of 23.

Anderson likes to say that his junior runner has a smell for the goalline. In the last three games, he scored eight TDs.

Carrying the ball 132 times this season, Morschauser has gained 608 yards for an avereage of 4.6 yards per carry.

Like any successful football team, Montclair State's de-

fense, headed by Little All-American candidate Pete Contaldi of Bayonne, is tough to score on.

In nine games, the Indians have yielded only 46 points with 18 coming in the defeat by Central Connecticut. The opposition has not gained 100 net yards rushing against the Indians in seven games.

The Indians secondary has picked off 21 enemy passes for a new all-time record and is led by safetyman Lonnie Moncelsi of Nutley and half-back John Brunelli of Palisades Park.

### Montclair Is Considered For Knute Rockne Bowl

clair State is one of nine College Division teams under consideration for the Knute Rockne Bowl football game to be played at Atlantic City's Convention Hall on Saturday evening, November 28, it was revealed yesterday by Jerry Casale, athletic director at Temple University and chairman of the selection commit-

The Indians, coached by Clary Anderson, are 7-1. They close out the regular season tomorrow afternoon at Glassboro State in a game that will decide the New Jersey State College Conference title.

Casale named the other eight teams under consideration as Alfred, Rochester, Westminster (Pa.), Washington and Jefferson, Randolph Macon, Trinity (Conn.) and Hampton Sydney.

If the practice of picking

one team from the North and one team from the South is followed, as done last year, the Indians competition for a bid would appear to come from Alfred (7-1), Rochester (7-1), Trinity (6-1) and Muhlenberg (6-1).

Alfred, fourth in the Lambert Bowl voting behind the second place Indians, has completed its season and lost only to Wilkes (Pa.).

Trinity will meet Wesleyan. The only defeat suffered by Trinity was at the hands of Rochester.

Rochester has won seven games in a row since getting trounced in its opener by Mt. Union, 61-30. The Yellowjackets close out the season tomorrow at Tufts.

Muhlenberg has two games remaining on its regular schedule. The Mules take on Franklin and Marshall tomorrow and complete the season against Moravian.

# Montanir St., Hampden in Rockne Bowl today

It is ironic, indeed, that in this "Year of the Quarter-back" for college football, Montclair State and Hampden-Sydney should meet in Atlantic City today in a bowl game bearing the name of Knute Rockne.

Rockne, of course, was on the receiving end of forward passes thrown by Gus Dorais in 1913 in a game that made the practice of throwing footballs standard procedure.

The famous Notre Dame end and coach might wonder if the passing art has been forgotten if he were in this chilly coastline resort today for the 2:30 kickoff.

Montclair State (8-1) has gained only 1,039 yards through the air, compared to 2.011 on the ground and the Tigers of Hampden-Sydney, Va., have a similar ratio with 1,006 passing and 2,144 running in ten (9-1) game.

There are so many similarities between the two teams, in fact, that some people are calling this the "Mirror Bowl."

Not only do both teams avoid tossing the ball around but both have been very hard on teams that do rely on passing games.


Montclair State has intercepted 20 enemy aerials and given up only 771 yards passing, while Hampden-Sydney has yielded only 629 through the air and has picked off 21.

Coach Clary Anderson, like his counterpart Stokeley Fulton, emphasizes defense and hall control, so points will be at a premium.

Asked if he would be sur-

prised if the game turned out to be a high-scoring affair, Anderson said, "I'd be more than surprised, I'd be amazed."

Hampden - Sydney have given up just 22 points in their last nine games since dropping their opener, 6-0, to Maryville, Va. Montclair State has permitted the opposition 45 points while winning the New Jersey State Athletic Conference title.









ATLANTIC CUTY — John Brunelli and coach Clary Anderson were each given game balls here Saturday in the jubiliant Montclair State dressing room after the team's thrilling 7-6 decision over Hampden-Sydney in the second annual Knute Rockne Bowl game.

Brunelli explained that his responsibility switches from play to play. "Sometimes I pick up the outside man and sometimes we invert our re-sponsibilities," he said, "In most cases my responsi-

bility is with the short man and Eve got to protect the flat," he said.











# Moniciair St.: Only N.J. school to win national football title

Only once in the proud history of New Jersey college sports has a team won a national football championship. That honor fell to Montclair State in 1970, before Division 3 was invented by the NCAA. At that time, the Knute Rockne Bowl was contested for the U.S. Small Colleges title:

And a men's basketball national crown came to New Jersey for just the first, time last March when Rowan clipped Hope of Michigan, 100-93, for the Division 3 championship.

The football game was played in Atlantic City Convention Hall and the contestants were Montclair State and Hampden-Sydney of Virginia, Monte clair was coached by the legendary Clary Anderson, who posted more than 1,000 victories in a plethora of sports at Montclair State after a superb career at Blair Academy and Montclair High, At Montclair High, his teams won 19 NJSIAA North Jersey, Section 2, Group 4 championships before the playoffs and 12 times were named the unofficial state champions. There were 12 unbeaten seasons. His combined high school record in football, baseball, basketball, lce\_hockey and swimming was 957-276-16.

At Montclair State, his football teams went 46-20-3, Montclair State won five New Jersey Athletic Conference titles during his tenure.

Tony Valpone of Sea Girt cherishes the ring presented team members by the college for the national hampionship. That season, he ran or 928 yards.

But he missed the big trip back by bus to Montclair, a journey that inded with a police and fire-truck esport from the town border to the cambus, with sirens blaring. He stayed in Itlantic City: to celebrate with his parents.

"We beat Hampden Sydney, 7-6," he recalled. "I scored our touchdown from the two in the third quarter. We marched down the fleid. We bried to score twice running outside from inside the 10. Then I took the ball from Bob Brewster (current Westfield High baseball coach) and cracked in over the right side behind Al Avignone and John Bellavia.

"Hampden-Sydney came back to score in the fourth quarter and tried to win it with a two-point conversion. But John Brunelli knocked down the pass in the end zone."

"We had a lot of guys from north Jersey on the team: Mike VanZile (former head coach at Passaic Valley High and now an assistant AD at Wallkill Valley) was one of them. He was a defensive end out of Butler!"

In men's pasketball last winter, Rowan completed a 28-4 season by beating Hope on March 16 in the Division 3 final in Salem Va. But that team lost four starters and four other varsity stalwarts at graduation, Terrence Stewart, who was the leader, finishing with a school career best 1,628 points and as the NCAA tournament MVP, is gone Rowan has been to the NCAA tournament eight times.

The first national team championship of any kind for New Jersey was provided by Princeton, which won its first of nine golf titles in 1914.

Without Mercer County, the New Jersey championship bag would be a lot smaller. Mercer County teams at the junior and senior college levels have won 55 of the 82 national titles collected by teams from New Jersey.

Princeton leads the Division I pack with 14 championships. Butnearby College of New Jersey, once known as Trenton State, is way ahead of everyone in men's, and women's play with 31 NCAA titles in Division 3 and two in NAIA competition, Mercer County College, and its previous incarnation as Trenton Junior College have won eight times in the National Junior College Athletic Association men's soccer tournament held annually at its campus in West Windsor.
